

# **Setting The Course**

#### A TIME FOR PREPARATION

According to the calendar, mid-summer occurs in early August. The wonderful warm weather activities that thrived throughout July continue into the eighth month in all their splendor. The days of high temperatures, humidity, and dew points continue. So do vacation travels, trips to the lakes, parks, and county fairs, and perhaps an occasional jaunt to the ball park to take in a game. Summer reigns supreme!

However, signs of approaching fall begin to appear. The days continue to shorten, and overnight low temperatures in northern areas of the state can even produce a frost. First the administrators and counselors and then teachers return to the schools to prepare for the fall term. The Great Minnesota Get Together – the State Fair – opens its gates for a 12 day run, ending on Labor Day. Suddenly, one realizes that fall has arrived, even though a few weeks still remain until the autumnal equinox, and with it our return to the everyday activities that characterize our lifestyles for most of the year.

For Lions and clubs recognizing the benefits derived from planning in advance, August becomes a pivotal month. The "month before fall" represents a critical time for clubs' executive officers and boards to review and fine tune plans for the next 10 months, to develop strategies for exciting members about and involving them in upcoming activities, to "Dare to Dream" about things never done before and seek ways to make them happen, and to reaffirm the ingredient that enriches our community of volunteers and makes membership in it something special – the joy of being together.

August, too, represents the best time to contact school officials about Lions programs for youth. The staff has returned, but not the students, and would likely find more time and willingness to lend a sympathetic ear toward explanations of youth-related activities. Look at the list of youth programs on page 1 of this issue, select the ones with which your club would like to get involved, contact the related Cabinet member for information on how to get started, and visit with school officials. You might find that making things happen becomes easier than you first thought.

August – a time to continue summer relaxation and fun, but also a time of passage, a unique month when plans take form and dreams move toward realities, when early planning builds bridges to later successes, when self-confidence begins an ascent to enthusiastic involvement, and when creative guiding of a club's destiny makes leaders feel good about being Lions. It's truly a month of introspection and preparation.

Before the fall term begins, contact a local school about putting on a student assembly about Lions and Lions-related activities, possibly during American Education Week. The assembly would stress the importance of volunteering and the volunteer work that Lions do in the communities they serve. The

program could include a blind person with his/her leader dog and story to tell, Lions Eye Bank, diabetes, hearing programs, and LCIF representatives, as well as testimonies from people in the community who have benefited from volunteer work by Lions. Video clips could be included as well.

The assembly could set the stage for promotion of a Leo Club at the school. If you are interested, use the appropriate Cabinet members as resource persons.

#### INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

An estimated 9,000 to 10,000 persons attended the 87<sup>th</sup> Lions Clubs International Convention at Detroit/ Windsor from July 5-9. Most of the events took place at the Cobo Convention Center and Joe Louis Arena.

The annual LCI Parade, including 144 delegations, provided a rousing start to the event. 5M participants wore their multiple polo shirts and straw hats (2003-2004 DG's wore their DG coats) and were followed by a giant inflated snowman. Persons on both sides of the marching lines carried snowman banners. The Sauk Rapids Marching Band won first place in the high school category.

Three plenary sessions provided a focus for the convention. Highlights included a very impressive flag ceremony, memorial service, nominations for 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President and Int'I Directors, address by 2003-2004 Intl President Dr. Tae-Sup Lee, keynote address by Coretta Scott King, installation of and address by 2004-2005 Intl President Clem Kusiak, presentation of newly elected officers and directors, and installation of 2004-2005 District Governors.

4119 delegates elected Jimmie Ross (TX) 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President. Maynard Rucks (Henderson, MN) won one of the Intl Director positions.

740 of the 746 District Governors-Elect worldwide attended a DGE training seminar (mostly at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Dearborn) for 5 days prior to the convention.

On the last evening, dressed in formal white suitcoats and black pants, they attended a commencement banquet at Cobo.

During the DGE training, soon to be Intl President Clem Kusiak announced that each incoming DG will become a non-voting Trustee of LCIF. Each DGE was given a lapel pin showing this office.

The LCI Supply Store outlet at the convention conducted a brisk trade Shoppers took advantage of a 10% discount on items.

The convention carried an international air. People conducted conversations in many different languages, & a number of participants wore native attire. At the DGE seminar, an impressive interfaith service on video offered prayers from a variety of faiths. Throughout the week, however, smiling faces and camaraderie soon eased the cultural differences among peoples.

Pin traders, especially from India, were quite active during the convention. About 4 Japanese clubs

received recognition for being 100% Melvin Jones Fellow Clubs.

With the slogan Hong Kong Live It – Love It, a delegation from the Chinese region promoted early registration for the 2005 convention.
